Congress Raises Nation's Debt Ceiling

On December 16, **President Biden** signed into law a \$2.5 trillion increase to the debt ceiling after the House 221 to 209 and the Senate voted 50-49.

The hike will lift the limit by \$2.5 trillion and is expected to cover all government bills set to come due by 2023.

Legislative Session to Begin January 11

House and Senate members will soon address numerous issues including the proposed FY 2022-23 budget and redistricting Congressional and Legislative districts.

The need for workforce housing is expected to draw attention.

Gov DeSantis Proposes \$99.7 billion budget.....

DeSantis' new budget priorities focus on education, environment, law enforcement, and a reduction in the State gas tax.

It includes \$1.17 billion tax cut package which comprises four sales tax holidays, a 25-cent cut in the gas tax and \$15.3 billion in reserves.

Business Liability Protection/ Healthcare Providers – <u>S 7014</u> by **Sen Burgess** extends last year's sunset provision (March 14) to June 1, 2023; and it will provide liability protections for health care providers that have complied in good faith with Sunshine State health standards in COVID-19 related matters.

Teacher Salaries - <u>S 298</u> by Sen Book

would allow local school boards to use state funds for other personnel if the district has met the minimum base salary for teachers.

Fischer regarding advertising, taxes, expands authority of local laws/ ordinances to require vacation rentals to register with local rental registration programs

Damages to Business/Local Government - <u>S 620</u> by **Sen Travis Hutson** creates a cause of action for established business (operating for 3 plus years) to recover loss of business damages from a county/municipality whose regulatory action has caused a 15% of revenue or profit loss, excluding orders or declarations passed due to an emergency.

County Council and School Board Finalize New District Maps

With a end of the year Charter deadline approaching, the County Council unanimously adopted their re-districted maps at their December 14 meeting.

Using the most recent US Census data which showed Volusia's total population at 550,701...the target number for each district was 110,000.

The Council aimed to maintain population parity, preserving city boundaries, keeping minority populations intact and not splitting communities that have geographically connected populations and share common social and economic interests.

Also on December 14, by a 3-2 vote, the School Board approved Resolution 2021-26 to change School Board Member Residence Areas Per the 2020 Census.

County Council's 2022 Kick Off Meeting.....

At their January 6 meeting, the County Council made several decisions for 2022... **Barb Girtman** was selected Vice Chair and their meetings will continue on 1st /3rd Tuesdays, 9:30 am.

Council committee/assignments were agreed upon. <u>Click here</u> to see Committee assignments. Former County Chair **Frank Bruno** was assigned to the Elections Canvassing Board.



Beach Vendors...the Council voted 7-0 to keep the current Volusia Beach Rentals/ Refreshments vs a bid from Boucher Brothers of Miami. Council consensus was that local vendors have performed well.

The Council approved an additional \$2.5 million in **State Housing Investment Partnership** (SHIP) program income to their budget. The County originally estimated at income at \$800,000 but the sale of 2 multi-family rental developments generated the \$2.5 million.

These additional funds will be placed in reserves until allocated for SHIP eligible homeownership or rental activities, and must be expended by June, 2024.

The County received \$2.6 million from the Dept of Housing & Urban Development (HUD) to be used to assist homeless, at-risk of homelessness. These funds could be used for affordable housing, tenant-based rental assistance, supportive services, etc. This money will be placed in a reserve account until a HOME-ARP Allocation Plan is completed and approved by the Council and HUD.

Daytona Beach City Commission Approves Downtown Apartment Complex



December 15, Daytona Beach City Commission voted unanimously give Framework Group a \$7.5 million property tax break to construct a 290-unit apartment complex (and 500-space parking garage) on a 3.5-acre site on N Beach St over the next 12 years.

By investing \$80 million, Framework Group would be reimbursed 80% of the property taxes over a 12-year period. Once the units are occupied, the City would still collect more than \$2 million in property taxes until 2036....afterwards the city would keep 100% of the city property tax revenue.

While this development includes no workforce units, Framework is seeking to build 14 townhomes and 48 apartments on Orange Ave.

Having a residential project of this size on Beach St will definitely add consumer activity to the downtown business shops, cafes and service type businesses.

Daytona Beach City Commission Postpones Redistricting Process

At their January 5 meeting, the Daytona Beach City Commission heard a **REDISTRICTING PRESENTATION** from WGI as to the process for redrawing Zone Boundaries for 2022 elections. However, ONLY Zones 1,3 and 5 will be up for elections (see Candidate's Page). The consensus of the Commission was to postpone the mapping process until March 2023 (or sooner) in time for the 2024 elections.

Deland's Putnam Hotel to be Renovated!!

The Deland Historic Preservation Board recently approved a project that will convert the former Hotel Putnam into apartments.

Located at 121 W NY Ave, the building is owned by Axia Partners,. It will be formally named Putnam Estates and will house 64 one and two bedroom apartments.

This project is expected to be completed within the year.

City of Oak Hill and County Working Towards A Central Sewer Collection System

Both the City and County have a MOU to fund the construction of a centralized sewage collection.


Oak Hill has already received legislative funds and a grant from the Fla Dept of Environmental Protection and St. Johns River Water Management District to construct a central sewer collection system. Oak Hill Mayor Doug Gibson was at the January 6 Council meeting along with County's Public Works Director Ben Bartlett and Water Resources & Utilities Director Mike Ulrich.

Groundbreaking event for this project will be January 19, 11 am at East Ariel Rd x US 1. This has got to be a plus for the Indian River Lagoon!

Treasure Island Inn on DB Shores Agenda next week....

On Monday, January 10, the DB Shores Planning Board will address an agreement with 2025 South Atlantic Avenue, LLC to permit the redevelopment of the Treasure Island properties and the demolition of the existing structure. It will enable the owner/developer to redevelop the Treasure Island and Sunny Shores parcels with a development containing 300 hotel units and 200 residential units. More details must be worked out with the property owner.

County Council Zone 2 Candidates Discuss Issues

On January 6, the Daytona Beach Beachside Neighborhood Watch hosted a Candidates Forum for Volusia County Council Zone 2. **Candidates Chase Tramont and Paul Zimmerman** addressed numerous issues. **Candidate Danny Fuqua** was unable to attend due to a death in the family.



A few comments from the forum.....

Homeless/Panhandling/First Step Shelter

Chase Tramont – individuals have the constitutional right to panhandle but Cities can and have adopted ordinances to determine when/where panhandling can occur. *Note* – *Tramont supported the Port Orange Panhandling Ordinance.*

First Step Shelter gives police officers another location besides jail to take homeless individuals. Its purpose is to get homeless individuals with a case manager, job training/counseling and 'mainstream' them on to a half-way house....and NOT keep them indefinitely.

Paul Zimmerman – First Step Shelter is NOT a "come as you are"...homeless must be taken there by a police officer. Deland's Neighborhood Center IS "come as you are". Truth is..being homeless is not illegal and many of these individuals like that lifestyle. Daytona Beach is home to most Social Service agencies for homeless....would like these agencies spread out more.

Top Infrastructure Need in the County?

Both candidates agreed that LPGA should be top priority.

Impact Fees?

Both candidates agreed to increase them.

1-Cent Infrastructure Sales Tax Referendum?

Chase Tramont – people voted against the 2019 half-cent referendum....tax increases hurt working families...cannot support another referendum.

Paul Zimmerman – County has a \$1.1 billion budget and it contains lots of waste. I led the opposition to the 2019 referendum....would oppose it again.

Pay for New Roads?

Chase Tramont – government needs to live within its means. County should collaborate with state/ federal government and leverage funding from those sources.

Paul Zimmerman – again, County has a \$1.1 billion budget and use existing funds along with state/ federal funds.

Septic to Sewer?

Chase Tramont – oppose <u>forced</u> septic to sewer. Local government should work with homeowners to alleviate hook-up costs.

Paul Zimmerman - support septic to sewer; package systems allowed for out-of-control growth.

Both candidates did a superb job of explaining their stand on each issue. I want to congratulate **Anne Ruby** for organizing an informative program. Estimated 75-80 in attendance.....


