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Legislature hosts Organizational Session Nov 22



Sen Kathleen Passidomo was officially elected Senate President and Rep Paul Renner as Speaker of the House.

With this election.....

28 Republicans vs 12 Democrats in the Senate

85 Republicans vs 35 Democrats in the House.

With their supermajority, Republicans can shut Democrats out of much of the legislative debate process, including adding last-minute



amendments. Capital sources say that DeSantis' clout is likely to increase with a more Republican House and Senate.

In particular, whereas the Senate was once the moderate/deliberative entity, there were a number of moderate Republicans who could join with Democrats to stop certain bills. That situation may no longer exists. Nine house members have now come over to the Senate (7 Republicans and 2 Democrats)

filed in the 2023 Session.

House Speaker Renner named taxes, inflation and insurance as priorities. Senate President Passidomo wants to concentrate on consumer issues.

Special Session will be Dec 12-16

Gov **DeSantis** called for a **Special Session** to pass tax relief for Hurricane Ian victims and pass changes to property insurance laws.

Six insurance companies are out of business since January and that was before Hurricane Ian hit on Sept 28.

So, House Speaker Renner wants more private companies writing business and reduce the policies in the state-run Citizens Property Insurance Corporation, which has now has increased from 380,000 to 1.1 million policies in little over two years.

Doing so, "will shore up the market and put downward pressure on premiums over time". However, Renner noted that "premiums won't drop overnight after Legislative reforms.....probably two, three years as those policies turn over and we see a drop in litigation."

He hinted more taxpayer funds may be used to help companies buy reinsurance. Several reinsurance giants have shunned the Florida market, which saw \$1.5 billion in losses over the last two years. Last May, legislators set up a \$2 billion reinsurance fund Bills regarding education and abortion could likely be using taxpayer money. It's unclear if claims from Hurricane Ian will require those funds to be used.

Emergency Mgnt Director Jim Judge briefs Council

County Council Assesses the Storm Damage

November 15 - **Public Works Director Ben Bartlett** — the county has assessed about \$30 million in damage in coastal assets from both storms — dude walkovers, restrooms, beachramps, lifeguard stations.

Separate from that, **County Emergency Management Director Jim Judge** said property damage on Volusia's coast <u>now totals</u> \$525 million (and that may increase).

County staff met with **Gov Desantis** and staff on November 11 to inspect damage throughout the county. On November 15, Council members voted to ask the state for supplemental assistance.

The Dept of Environmental Protection (DEP) is allowing temporary repairs to help fortify damaged sea walls. DEP will provide \$20 million for beach renourishment to deal with sand dune erosion.

The Council is also asking for Congressional assistance with the Army Corps of Engineers on beach restoration.

Regional Staff Visit

November 11 - regional staff members, Tom Self (Senator Marco Rubio) Barry Cotton (Senator Rick Scott) and Justin Krause (Cong Mike Waltz) were in town for a "visit day".



They attended the Volusia Economic Development Office' quarterly breakfast, followed by a roundtable meeting to discuss storm recovery with Port Orange Mayor Don Burnette, DB Shores Commissioner Richard Bryan, Volusia Councilman-elect Matt Reinhart, Daytona Chamber's Shawn Richmond and Trane Corp's Gary Kreisler.

They toured storm damage at **Beachside Hotel with Jay Suarez and Anna Ventura** (see pic below)





School Board Increases Impact Fees

November 15 - **Volusia School Board voted 4-1 to increase their impact fee** \$2942 to *\$7,022 on sin-gle-family homes and \$3,728 on multi-family units*.

Since 2013, developers paid the district per residential unit to offset the increase in students it brought into the system.

HB 337, passed in 2021, limited fee increases to no more than 12.5% per year and no more than 50% at once. The School Board used an exception to this cap allowing a higher increase for "extraordinary circumstances."

Volusia Bldg Industry Assn (VBIA) offered a \$3500-\$4000 fee for all properties.

Board members Carl Persis, Anita Burnette and Jamie Haynes voted YES; Linda Cuthbert voted No.

Impact Fee revenue will be \$14.5 million-ish <u>this</u> <u>year</u>.....with more expected from the higher fees.....with approximately \$240 million going to school renovations/classroom additions.

Absent of a legal challenge, the new fees will begin in 90 days.

Starting salary for Volusia School District Teachers - \$47,500 2021 – Florida Legislature approved HB 337, limiting a local government's ability to impose impact fees on builders and developers embarking on new residential and commercial construction projects.

An impact fee is a 1-time fee assessed by local government to developers/builders to offset a new development's impact on existing infrastructure.....i.e. basic charge on new construction to defray costs on existing services (schools, parks, roads, emergency services).

The new law says entities can only boost impact fees once every 4 years: Increases between 25-50% must be spread over 4 years.

An entity surpassing the 50% cap must perform a study showing why the increase is justified, host 2 workshops, and have a 2/3 majority vote.

Local News

Voters in **Daytona Beach Shores** approved a City Charter amendment to rename the "city council" to the "city commission", "city councilmembers" to "city commissioners", and "mayor-councilmember" to "mayor".



These changes will have no effect on the powers, duties, or compensation of city officials.

The DB City Commission met Nov. 15 with a focus on storm damage anything from the seawalls to the west, including buildings, come under the jurisdiction of the city.

It was reported that the governor's office is reducing the red tape to get a permit for sea walls but building permits are still required via the county and is regulated by the Department of Environmental Protection.

It was reported 26 properties in the city were declared unsafe, including three from Hurricane Ian, but that label is being lifted on several buildings and people are being allowed back....but only after they were inspected by structural engineers have to inspect buildings before the city's chief building official can deem them safe.

The Commission approved incentive grants to replace business signs. More information to come.

care advocates, nonprofits and the Fla Public Services Union, plans to bypass the Legislature and pursue Medicaid expansion via citizen initiative for a constitutional amendment on the 2024 ballot.

With 2.4 million Floridians without health insurance, expanding the federal program to provide health insurance to low-income people, would make an estimated 900,000 Floridians eligible.

Amendments must be approved by 60% of voters, not the simple majority and to get required 890,000 signatures.....thus a \$10 million campaign coalition. The legislature has opposed expanding Medicaid due to concerns that the State would be on the hook for rising medical costs and that incentives to expand the program are part of the Affordable Care Act, which Congressional Republicans have tried to repeal.

Fla has strict Medicaid eligibility requirementsadults with no children are not eligible no matter how little they earn. Neither are the adults of a family of three whose household income is above \$6,984.

5 million Floridians are currently enrolled in the program. Expanding it under the new ARA, means the feds will cover additional costs.

Senate President Kathleen Passidomo wants to hear the pros and cons of expanding Medicaid. She believes the state needs to increase the number of doctor residencies and address the nursing shortage....and how we pay for it." NOTE – Recreational pot could also be on that same ballot.

To get an amendment on the 2024 ballot would require signatures equal to 8% of votes cast in the last general election, with a percentage of those spread across at least 14 of Florida's 28 congressional districts.






Official Florida House Districts




Florida Senate Districts 7 and 8 Volusia area




Congressional Districts 6 and 7
