Local Entities Adopt FY 2023-24 Budgets

Daytona Beach City Commission adopted a \$138 million general fund budget and a 5.43 millage rate. It includes \$23 million designated for capital projects.... including flood mitigation, affordable housing, East ISB upgrade, JR Ballpark upgrades, S Ridgewood Ave fire station (to replace the current Beach/Orange Station).

County Council approved a \$1.3 billion overall budget including a 4.84 millage rate WHICH is combination of General Fund \$289 million or 3.39 mills combined with Sheriff's Public Safety \$130 million budget or 1.45 mills. Different accounting procedure this fiscal year.

Volusia School Board approved a \$1.4 billion total budget which means a 5.40 millage rate......9% higher than the rollback rate. Note....the School District's budget is pretty much determined in Tallahassee.

Ormond Beach City Commission approved a \$43.2 million general fund budget (3.92 mills vs 3.45 mills roll back rate).

Port Orange City Commission approved a \$58 million general fund budget (4.99 mills vs 4.44 mills roll back rate).

Edgewater City Commission adopted a \$94.7 million budget (6.33 mills vs 5.66 roll back rate)

Oak Hill City Commission adopted a \$3.3 million general fund budget (5.68 mills vs 5.16 mills roll back rate).

Ponce Inlet Town Council approved a \$9.7 million general fund budget (6.27 mills vs 4.89 mills roll back rate).

Regarding Transform 386 that's the \$328 HUD grant to assist the County with Hurricane recovery......Oct 3, the County Council voted 5-2 to approve an ACTION plan to be submitted to HUD for their review.

Councilmen Jeff Brower, Jake Johannson, Troy Kent, David Santiago voted YES. Danny Robins, Don Dempsey voted NO.

Upon their approval, HUD will send a grant agreement back to the county for approval and appropriation of the funds.

The grant will primarily focus on unmet needs in regards to single family housing rehab and replacement, rental housing repair, and multi-family housing.

The deadline for these policy holders to respond is Oct 10 and Citizens is telling these new customers that **no** opt out clause exists with these new policies, a premium of no more than 20% greater than Citizens' premium.

For several years now, Citizens Property Insurance has sought to shift a number of its policies to private sector insurers.

Federal Government Shutdown Avoided

On Saturday, Sept 30, a last-minute agreement passed the House and Senate with bipartisan majorities to keep the



government funded through Nov. 17.

At approximately 9 PM, the Senate voted 88-9 for a bill that will keep the government open until mid-November at current spend-

ing levels. Senators
Marco Rubio and Rick
Scott voted YES.

The bill, pushed by House Speaker Kevin McCarthy includes \$16 billion in disaster relief funds (which should help Fla's hurri-



cane recovery efforts) but does not include

new aid for Ukraine. House vote was 335 – 91



(Congressmen Cory Mills and Michael Waltz voted NO).

McCarthy brought up the new bill after House Republicans failed to pass a shortterm spending bill Sept 28.

President Joe Biden signed the bill into law late Saturday night.



House OUSTS McCarthy from Speaker's Post

Oct 3.....the House voted 216-210 to oust House Speaker Kevin McCarthy. 208 Democrats joined with 8 conservative Republicans to remove McCarthy. 210 Republicans voted to KEEP McCarthy.

Congs Cory Mills and Michael Waltz voted to KEEP McCarthy.

Freedom Caucus Republicans have had several disagreements since McCarthy was selected Speaker in January after 15 ballots.

Several caucus members, led by **Fla Cong Matt Gaetz** had a problem when McCarthy got Democrats to avoid a federal government shutdown by approving a 45-day extension of government spending.

The same arguments came into play last June during the debate over whether to increase the nation's debt ceiling. Freedom Caucus members, concerned with the growing national debt, criticized McCarthy for not securing steeper spending cuts out of the Biden administration.

A vacancy in the speaker's chair essentially paralyzes the House until a successor is chosen.

Republicans and Democrats are seeking nominees for speaker. McCarthy will NOT try to win back his post. It takes a majority of Republicans in their conference to put forward a nominee, who must then win a majority of the votes in House chamber to become Speaker. For now, the House has an **ACTING Speaker Patrick McHenry**, from North Carolina.

To be elected speaker, a candidate must receive a majority of the votes cast, as opposed to a majority of the full membership of the House – presently 218 votes, in a House of 435.

Electing a new House Speaker will be tricky since Congress has until November 17 to avert a government shutdown. Note-**There are 433 active House members** — **221 Republicans and 212 Democrats.**



Sept 19.....Brightline began service between
Miami and Orlando. There will be 16 daily round
trips with hourly departures. Other stops along the
route include West Palm Beach, Boca Raton, Ft
Lauderdale, and Aventura. Brightline is eventually
planning to have a station in Tampa.

What does this have to do with Volusia County? Long term plans for Brightline include Jacksonville and HOPEFULLY the route will be along 1-95.

Several years ago, a LOCAL committee was formed to generate interest to make Daytona Beach a stop along such a route. Several of the members of that committee now want to reorganize and make plans for locating and to lobby Brightline for a Daytona Beach station. It's never too soon to start.

FDOT DISTRICT 5

FDOT will also host a tentative 5-year work program on Tuesday, Oct. 17, 3:30 – 5
PIM at the District Five FDOT
Office in DeLand. It'll focus
on FDOT's 2024 to 2029
work program. The program

forecasts where and when funds are needed for improvements to roadways, transit, aviation, seaports, spaceports and other means of transportation.

Beach St. It'll focus on LPGA Blvd. improvements from US 92 to Williamson Blvd. The purpose is to accommodate existing and future travel demand and improve safety on LPGA Blvd and the I-95 interchange.

On September 30, Fla's minimum wage, increased from the current \$11.00 to \$12.00.

Tipped wage employees increased from \$7.98 to \$8.98 an hour. This is based on Amendment Constitutional 2 approved November 2020 to increase the state's minimum wage by \$1 each Sept until it's \$15 in 2026.

Daytona Beach was awarded a \$500,000 HUD grant to assist its Midtown area. The City is one of 14 communities nationwide to receive this Grant to revitalize Palmetto Park, Caroline Village and Walnut Oak properties as well as the surrounding Midtown neighborhood.

On a somewhat sad but congratulatory note, New Smyrna Beach city manager Khalid Resheidat announced that he is retiring next year after serving 34 years.

He's done an excellent job in running the city's administrative

details and was a good ambassador. He was also a good participant in county wide activities.

September 26, the New Smyrna Beach City Commission agreed to hiring an outside recruitment agency to conduct a nationwide search.





Sept 19-20.....Federal Reserve paused hiking interest rates.....thus holding rates steady at 5.25-5.5%.. taking a pause from an aggressive rate-hike campaign that began March 2022, in an effort

to bring the inflation rate to 2%.

However there were 4 rate hikes in 2023. The Federal Reserve meets 8 times annually and their next meeting is November 1.



CFO Patronis Returns \$40 Million in Unclaimed Property in September


Since 2017, CFO Patronis' office returned more than \$2.1 billion in unclaimed property to Florida citizens.






Official Florida House Districts




Congressional Districts 6 and 7
