County Council Sets Initial Tax Rates/Budget

July 11 - County Council set their FY 2023-24 TRIM tax rates required to support the county's operations. Notably, the proposed tax rates include a rate reduction for four property tax-supported funds in the county, while the others remained unchanged from the previous year's rates. This will be the first fiscal year to include the Public Safety Fund which will fund the Sheriff's Office.

The combination of a 3.39 mills General Fund property tax rate and the Public Safety Fund's 1.45 mills means a total 4.84 mills for the upcoming year.

<u>Tax rate reductions</u> are being proposed for the Library Fund, Ponce DeLeon Port Authority, Silver Sands Bethune Beach MSD. <u>Tax rates will remain unchanged</u> from the previous year for the Fire Rescue District, East Volusia Mosquito Control District, ECHO and Volusia Forever.

This is NOT the final tax rate...it's the CEILINGany rated adopted must be this rate or lower.

Truth in Millage (TRIM) notices should be in mail this month.

While the adopted tax rates could be lowered at a later date, they may not be increased.

Per Florida Tax Watch, Volusia is the 12th most populated county, ranks 55th out of 66 counties, with a per capita revenue of \$1,390...... statewide average is \$2,223.

The recommended FY 2023-24 operating budget is \$1.19 billion, with a \$289.2 million General Fund for countywide services. Click here to see the proposed budget presentation.

August 1—County Council added Affordable
Housing policies to the County's Comprehensive
Plan which will support their affordable housing
initiative, and will fulfill one of the objectives of
"The Path Forward – Affordable Housing Plan".
These changes will -

- facilitate future land development regulations and zoning code changes
- allows for impact fee waivers and density bonuses for affordable housing projects
- expedites the review process and allows for impact fee deferrals for Accessory Dwelling units (ADUs) if homeowner is willing to sign an affordability agreement
- allows for up to a 40% deviation from dimensional standards and allows for restrictive covenants to ensure that properties remain affordable.
- allows administrative approvals for nonconforming lots that could be used for affordable housing.

With these changes approved, revisions to the zoning ordinance and the land development regulations will follow next year to alleviate regulatory barriers for affordable housing.

According to a Florida Department of Transportation's economic impact study, **Daytona International Airport generates \$3.2 billion in economic impact annually**.

This was based on airport activity, visitor spending, industry reliance and military spending. It also considered dollars generated from flights in

and out of DAB, and dollars spent in the community by airport passengers. The impacts of Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University and Daytona International Speedway were



also included in the calculation.

Aviation & Economic Resources Director Cyrus Callum mentioned that airport's strategic location and prime real estate to assist in job opportunities and local business development.

New State Laws Began July 1....per recent legislative session.......

Gov DeSantis approved **Fees in Lieu of Security Deposits** legislation which authorizes

landlords to give tenants the option of paying a security deposit in monthly instalments....instead of charging some hefty \$3000 upfront deposit, tenants can pay it in monthly installments.

Hopefully, this will help many of our paycheck to paycheck working people able to move into a rental unit.

Fla's Sales Tax Holiday runs through Labor Day weekend.

Tax Free Items include:

- Outdoor recreation items for camping, fishing.....kayaks and canoes.
- Boating/water activity supplies.
- Museums, sporting event, theater tickets.
- Entry to state parks.
- Kids' toys and athletic equipment.

It's part of the FY 2023-24 budget and also includes a <u>permanent</u> sales tax exemption for baby and toddler items such as diapers, cribs, and strollers. It also includes a one-year sales tax exemption for gas stoves..

Interests of Foreign Countries (SB 264) prohibits investors from "countries of concern": Cuba, Venezuela, North Korea, Russia, Iran and Syria from purchasing agricultural land in Florida, or land within 10 miles of a military infrastructure facility.

However, it's being challenged in court by a group of Chinese citizens who argue it's a violation of their constitutional rights, as well as the Fair Housing Act.



The County hosted 6 community listening sessions in Ormond, Deland, Deltona, New Smyrna Beach, Port Orange and Daytona Beach regarding Transform386. This is related to the \$328.9 million Community Development Block Grant - Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) from the US Dept of Housing Urban Development (HUD).

Transform386 is intended to guide the County's restoration/revitalization plans related to Hurricane Ian. These HUD funds can be used for roads, bridges and stormwater systems, housing, with priority given to assisting low- to moderate-income households. Based on citizen input, the county will develop an action plan on how to use these funds.

Input received from these meetings/surveys, will be used to draft an Action Plan outlining the intended use of the funds. The draft plan is expected to be published in August. Look for the next Public Hearing on August 24, County Admin Bldg, Deland.

The FINAL plan must have County Council approval before being submitted to HUD. County staff anticipates the plan being approved by the end of 2023. Stay tuned.......

State Budget/Economic News.....

Gov DeSantis has signed an early paydown of \$400 million of the state's debt through the Debt Reduction Program (part of the FY 2023-24 State budget). It reduces state debt by accelerating the bond payoff thus avoiding \$34 million in interest costs.

NOW SOMEWHAT RELATED TO THAT.....Florida CFO Jimmy Patronis reported that CNBC ranks Fla as the nation's top economy.

Patronis ALSO mentioned the \$400 million debt paydown helps Fla *keep that perfect AAA bond rating for 5 years* while maintaining more than \$15 billion in reserves.

It further stated Fla's housing market is well-balance. Price appreciation is the fastest in the nation at around 15%, while construction activity is strong, and foreclosures are minimal. IT DID point out that affordability is an issue, and the insurance market is dicey.

DiBello has led the state's

brokered deals that added \$2.7 billion worth of state infrastructure since 2011. Among other duties, Space Florida assists companies with financing in the state, in addition to arranging launch pad leases from the Cape Canaveral Space Force Station..

14 applicants have applied to fill the position. Last week, a Space Fla Board committee has whittled the CEO search to 3 individuals:

- Col. Rob Long, commander of Space Force's Space Western Launch at Vandenberg Space Force Base.
- Dale Nash, who retired in 2021 as CEO Virginia's Commercial Space Flight Authority.
- Space Force Maj. Gen. John Olson, the Mobilization Assistant to the Chief of Space Operations at the Pentagon.



More Volusia Transform 386 News Update of New State Laws County Sets TRIM Property Tax Rate Meeting Dates for your calendar City/County Updates Volusia's Coalition for the Homeless is reporting more homeless living on the streets. In west Volusia, **Neighborhood Center CEO Waylan Niece** heads up efforts in Deland including their Bridge Shelter (this is similar to the 1st Step Shelter in DB). Last year, their 30-bed shelter served 336 individuals for short-term durations. BUT sadly to say...... there's a long waitlist for men and women seeking beds in the shelter.



This past January's point-in-time count by the Homeless Coalition found that DeLand had 147 unhoused individuals followed by Orange City with 29 then Deltona with 23. The overall Point in Time Count estimated that Volusia has just over 1000 homeless individuals...that counting east Volusia numbers. I take part in the count each year and recommend others to get involved next January.

Here's a **recent rundown from Fla Chamber's Score Card......** a compilation of vital economic statistics.....

- Fla Sales Tax Revenue.....\$3.8 billion per month...this is the amount of sales/use taxes collected each month
- Fla had 9,388 housing starts in April...a slight decrease from March. And 23,334 house sales....a slight decrease from March.





Fla Dept of Transportation's (FDOT) project to improve roadway safety along East Intl Speedway Blvd from the bridge to Atlantic Ave is under construction.

Traffic is being redirected to facilitate roadway widening and construction of a storm drain system. FPL and TECO are completing utility work.

There WILL be SOME traffic chaos in the area for a while but be patient. The final outcome will be well worth it. I'd like to recognize the Daytona Regional Chamber and the ISB Corridor Committee for garnering local entities to expedite this project. River to Sea TPO and City of Daytona Beach played major roles. You may not remember but ERAU agreed to postpone a road project on Clyde Morris Blvd in order to expedite this project on the priority list.



July 5 - Daytona Beach City Commission Moved Forward on Redistricting as they heard from Consultant Al Hill on population shifts in the City with a 9% increase to 71,000 residents.

The City overall plan is to

- keep approx 12,000 voters in all 6 districts
- keep minority populations intact
- keep special interest neighborhoods intact

With this in mind, **Commissioner Stacy Cantu's**Zone 4 saw residents moved into surrounding districts with the realization of many NEW residents moving into Zone 4 in the next year or so.

Look for future updates on this matter.

Daytona Beach Mayor Derrick Henry outlined his strategies for improving public safety along Seabreeze Blvd. With limited availability of FDOT-approved poles, he wants to expedite the placement of \$100,000 city-owned high-tech security cameras AND is asking business owners to partner

with the city to put cameras on their property while waiting for the installation of city cameras. **Zone 2 Commissioner Ken Strickland** provided \$80,000 (allocated from his Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund) and **Mayor Henry** will contribute \$20,000 for the project as a means to deter crime and assist law enforcement.

FPL will also provide brighter LED lighting fixtures on Seabreeze to better illuminate crosswalks from Halifax to Atlantic avenues. Henry also discussed extended hours permits allowing bars, nightclubs/lounges remaining open until 2 AM. 13 businesses on Seabreeze Blvd and Grandview Ave currently have extended hours permits. He wants to review requirements and work with businesses to possibly add more measures.



US Army Corps of Engineers WILL SOON BE conducting a feasibility study OF THAT chronic flooding in the Daytona Beach's MIDTOWN NEIGHBOR-

HOODS. THIS is typically a 6-8 month process since the city is receiving the entire cost of the study from the federal government.

Several months ago, an **CONG MIKE WALTZ** called a Daytona Beach City Commission meeting to announce the study. It appears that all paper work is being completed and the study will hopefully begin soon.

The **Port Orange Planning Commission recommended approval of the Master Development**



Agreement (MDA) and Conceptual Development Plan (CDP) for the Bristol Development Group's mixed-use project at Riverwalk. Bristol has named it Riveryard. This 11

acre site on the NE corner of Dunlawton/
Ridgewood...... This will provide the framework
for the development of ±30,000 square ft of
commercial space, waterfront park
(performance pavilion, trails, swings/benches,
etc.), riverfront bar/restaurant, hotel, 460-multifamily units, parking garage, marina, as well as
other amenities. The <u>Riveryard project is set to</u>
go before the Port Orange CRA/City Council on
August 15.





Last April, Volusia County launched a one-year pilot ReGrow the Loop program to enhance the beauty of the 30-mile Ormond Scenic Loop & Trail in Ormond Beach.

The county partnered with UF Extension and other local organizations to eradicate invasive plant species, increase native vegetation, attract more wildlife and pollinators, and share information on how residents can protect this area of the county.

The Daytona Beach City Commission approved a measure to relocate their downtown Farmer's Market from Magnolia Ave to the Riverfront Esplanade. DDA cited declining attendance,

lack of vendors and financial challenges). The Downtown Farmers Market has been operated on City Island and more recently Magnolia Ave for more than 30 years.

With this relocation the Downtown Development Authority DDA is expecting to have more customers, more vendors and more activities to the market. *In addition, the market will now operate on Sundays.....the new operations will begin later this month.*



Currently, the U.S. Space Force (USSF) is reliant on commercial providers AND as launches increase in the coming years, new authorities are needed to support launch infrastructure to ensure the U.S. AND Fla maintains its leadership in space.

SO.....Sen Marco Rubio introduced the <u>Enhancing</u> <u>Spaceport Operations Act</u> to help accommodate the additional launches between USSF and commercial launch providers.

This legislation would directly benefit Cape Canaveral Space Force Station.

If I'm not mistaken, this is something that Space Fla has been concerned with sometime back.....in other words....we NEED the capacity TO BALANCE MILITARY and commercial launches. Every time I see that smoke trail from a rocket to the south of us, I smell money for central Fla so I like this bill!

July 10 - Rep Cory Mills was interviewed by Neal Cavuto on Fox Business. A member of the House Armed Services Committee and the House Foreign Affairs Committee, Mills stated the US needs to bolster its industrial base......"for too long we continue to rely on outside



sources for raw materials from adversarial nations like China and Russia".

We do not have the capability to provide long-term contracting resources. There was always this mind-set that we would just get it abroad."

Mills wants the US to take control of our supply chain, our resources, our raw materials."

Mills also reiterated "China is expanding out wi

Mills also reiterated, "China is expanding out with economic coercion. They are not a competitor."

Cong Mike Waltz recently called for Congress to establish a special committee on artificial intelligence (AI).

We need a small/select committee that spans different jurisdic-



tions.....comprised of members who best understand its complexities.....

When it comes to AI innovation and deployment, **Rep. Waltz** saw both sides.

From a safety standpoint, we might need to tap the brakes on this rapidly emerging technology.

But also, slowing down AI innovation, could put the U.S. at a disadvantage with adversaries – like China.

From Axios.....

Federal minimum wage \$7.25...since 2009. If adjusted for inflation, it'd be \$10.24.

Fla's minimum wage is \$11.00....and scheduled to increase \$1 each September until it reaches \$15 in 2026.

Three states and 16 cities raised their <u>minimum</u> wage this summer, many of them automatic via inflation adjustments.

Oregon increased 70 cents to \$14.20 via automatic inflation adjustment. Portland's wage went up to \$15.45.

Washington D.C.'s wage increased via inflation adjustment to \$17.

Nevada increased to \$11.25 per legislation. Connecticut's wage increased \$1 to \$15. Inflation adjustments happened in 12 California cities.....

- San Francisco (\$18.07),
- Los Angeles (\$16.78)
- West Hollywood (\$19.08), highest in US

Summary of Live Local Act SB 102

Aims to provide more affordable rental units and affordable housing purchases.

It includes new items for affordable housing......

- Adds \$811 million in total funding including \$150 million a year to the SAIL and SHIP programs over 10 years.
- Florida Hometown Heros program provides \$100 million to help law-enforcement, hospital workers, firefighters buy homes with down payment assistance. <u>It was increased from \$25,000</u> to \$35,000
- Provides up to a \$5,000 refund for sales tax paid on building materials used to construct an
 affordable housing unit funded through the FHFC.
- Creates a new tax donation program to allow corporate taxpayers to direct certain tax payments to the FHFC, up to \$100 million annually, to fund the SAIL program.

Private sector to encourage private sector development by instead of paying a portion of your corporate and insurance tax premiums. You can donate to SAIL which is helping to develop affordable housing.

THREE DIFFERENT PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS

- Exemption for property owners who can offer affordable housing and extremely low income or very low income or both
- An exemption for land, owned by nonprofit, for at least 99 years as affordable housing for extremely low to moderate income families
- Authorizes local option for property tax exemption to the property owners who dedicate units for affordable housing to extremely low or low income Floridians

Missing middle exemption, property tax exemption for new or recently rehabilitated of elements that set aside at least 70 current market rate units into affordable units.

Local governments cannot regulate the use density or height (with some exemptions) of affordable housing development if they propose a rental project that is multi family or mixed use residential. So if the project is built for affordable housing.....a developer can forgo some local regulations.

Encourages the use of public property for affordable housing and allows for expedited permits.

No more rent control

Makes local government post online/advertise their local government owned property that could be suitable for affordable housing projects.

FITCH DOWNGRADES US' LONG-TERM RATINGS FROM "AAA TO AA+"

Fitch Ratings agency stated, "over the last 20 years, there has been a deterioration in governance standards regarding fiscal/debt matters i.e. the June bipartisan agreement to suspend the debt limit until January 2025".

These repeated debt-limit political standoffs and last-minute resolutions have eroded confidence in fiscal management. Tax cuts and new spending initiatives have meant successive debt increases over the last decade.

And.....there's been only limited progress in addressing rising social security and Medicare costs due to an aging population.

Fitchs' downgrade might signal Wall Street's concerns about political chaos/debt limit squabbles that's becoming commonplace in Washington.

Still, the nation's economy is performing well. **Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen** called the downgrade "arbitrary" and is based on old data. **SO...what does this mean?** Some investors who are required to put money only in AAA-rated securities may need to look elsewhere potentially nudging up interest rates. Most economists believe that what the <u>Fed does at its September 19</u> -20 rate-setting meeting will have a bigger effect on US borrowing costs.

Still, there's growing concern about political polarization, over federal spending which could mean another debt limit impasse in Washington and threaten another government shutdown.

Future downgrades by Fitch or other two agencies could threaten America's fiscal health.

Fitch is one of three major credit ratings firms, along with Moody's and S&P Global Ratings.

In 2011, S&P downgraded the US credit rating amid a debt-limit standoff — the first time the US was removed from a list of risk-free borrowers. Fitch's downgrade is the second in US history




Florida Senate Districts 7 and 8 Volusia area






Congressional Districts 6 and 7
